



Beaminster School Privacy Notice for Pupils

This notice applies to all personal data collected whether by form, letter, email, face to face meeting, telephone, online or other means.

How we use pupil information

The categories of pupil information that we collect, hold and share include (but are not limited to) such things as:

- Personal information (e.g. name, unique pupil number, address, contact details)
- Characteristics (e.g. ethnicity, language, nationality, country of birth and free school meal eligibility, LAC)
- Safeguarding information (e.g. court orders and professional involvement)
- Attendance information (e.g. sessions attended, number of absences, absence reasons, schools attended)
- Assessment information (e.g. national curriculum assessments, exam results)
- Relevant medical information (e.g. medical/health conditions, allergies, medications)
- Special educational needs and disabilities (including needs and ranking)
- Behaviour information (e.g. exclusions, information from other agencies)
- Trips and visits information
- Post-16 (e.g. UCAS information)
- Personal information/contact details of students' parents, carers and/or other relatives.

Why we collect and use this information

We use the pupil data:

- to support pupil learning
- to monitor and report on pupil progress
- to provide appropriate pastoral care
- to assess the quality of our services
- to keep children safe
- to manage trips and visits, cashless catering (including Free School Meals management) and other financial systems
- identity management authentication
- to help with service and financial planning
- to provide relevant information about school related matters
- to comply with the law regarding data sharing
- to comply with the statutory and legal requirements of a school.

The lawful basis on which we use this information

We collect and use pupil information to comply with legal obligations for running a school: "Public task" or "statutory duty" under the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 Article 6 and Article 9 of the GDPR, including special category data, and Equality Act 2010 We will seek specific, informed consent where necessary.



Collecting pupil information

Whilst the majority of pupil information you provide to us is mandatory, some of it is provided to us on a voluntary basis. In order to comply with the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), we will inform you whether you are required to provide certain pupil information to us or if you have a choice in this, and seek informed consent where required.

Storing pupil data

We hold pupil data securely for varying lengths of time depending on the nature of the information and in line with current retention guidelines.

Who we share pupil information with

We routinely share pupil information with (but not limited to):

- schools/colleges/education/training/other establishments pupils attend after leaving us
- 3rd party online learning services (e.g. Accelerated Reader, Seneca, MyMaths etc)
- our local authority (Dorset Council)
- the Department for Education (DfE)
- the Sir John Colfox Academy (Joint Sixth Form), other schools/colleges etc
- UCAS, careers advisers/organisations, exam boards
- NHS, health and social care, youth support services and other relevant outside agencies.

Why we share pupil information

We do not share information about our pupils with anyone without consent unless the law and our policies allow us to do so.

We share pupils' data with the Department for Education (DfE) on a statutory basis. This data sharing underpins school funding and educational attainment policy and monitoring.

We are required to share information about our pupils with our local authority (LA) and the Department for Education (DfE) under section 3 of The Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

Data collection requirements

Youth support services

Pupils aged 13+

Once our pupils reach the age of 13, we also pass pupil information to our local authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.



This enables them to provide services as follows:

- youth support services
- careers advisers.

A parent or guardian can request that **only** their child's name, address and date of birth is passed to their local authority or provider of youth support services by informing us. This right is transferred to the child / pupil once he/she reaches the age 16.

Pupils aged 16+

We will also share certain information about pupils aged 16+ with our local authority and / or provider of youth support services as they have responsibilities in relation to the education or training of 13-19 year olds under section 507B of the Education Act 1996.

This enables them to provide services as follows:

- post-16 education and training providers
- youth support services
- careers advisers.

The National Pupil Database (NPD)

The NPD is owned and managed by the Department for Education and contains information about pupils in schools in England. It provides invaluable evidence on educational performance to inform independent research, as well as studies commissioned by the Department. It is held in electronic format for statistical purposes. This information is securely collected from a range of sources including schools, local authorities and awarding bodies.

We are required by law, to provide information about our pupils to the DfE as part of statutory data collections such as the school census and early years' census. Some of this information is then stored in the NPD. The law that allows this is the Education (Information About Individual Pupils) (England) Regulations 2013.

The department may share information about our pupils from the NPD with third parties who promote the education or well-being of children in England by:

- conducting research or analysis
- producing statistics
- providing information, advice or guidance

The Department has robust processes in place to ensure the confidentiality of our data is maintained and there are stringent controls in place regarding access and use of the data.



Decisions on whether DfE releases data to third parties are subject to a strict approval process and based on a detailed assessment of:

- who is requesting the data
- the purpose for which it is required
- the level and sensitivity of data requested
- the arrangements in place to store and handle the data.

To be granted access to pupil information, organisations must comply with strict terms and conditions covering the confidentiality and handling of the data, security arrangements and retention and use of the data.

Requesting access to your personal data

Under data protection legislation, parents and pupils have the right to request access to information about them that we hold. To make a request for your personal information, or be given access to your child's educational record, contact the school office.

You also have the right to:

- object to processing of personal data that is likely to cause, or is causing, damage or distress
- prevent processing for the purpose of direct marketing
- object to decisions being taken by automated means
- in certain circumstances, have inaccurate personal data rectified, blocked, erased or destroyed; and
- claim compensation for damages caused by a breach of the Data Protection regulations
