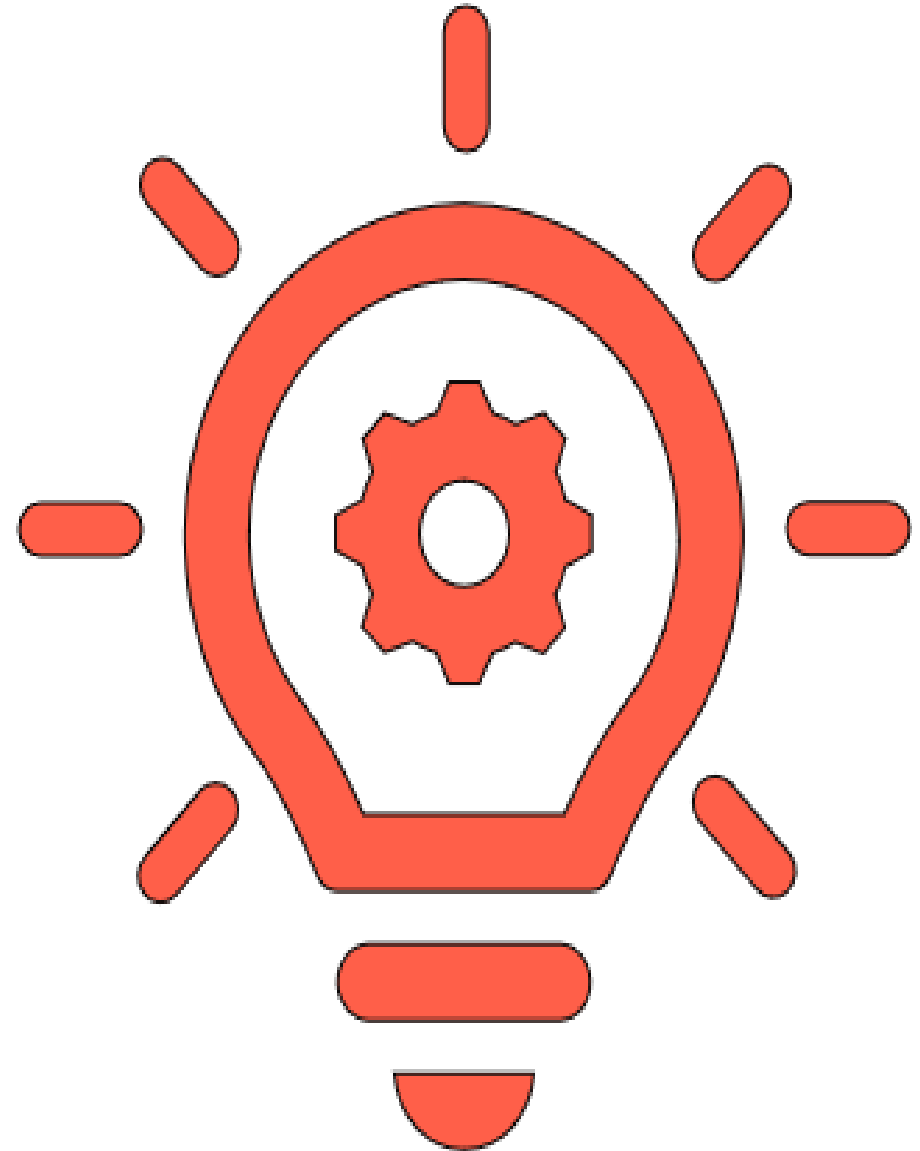




Is a career in law for

Different types of “lawyers”

Barrister

- Wears a wig and goes to court
- Is an 'advocate'
- Specialises in 'contentious' work
- Represents clients in courts, tribunals and inquiries
- Provides legal advice as well as advocacy
- Is self-employed but work alongside other barristers in “sets”



Different types of “lawyers”

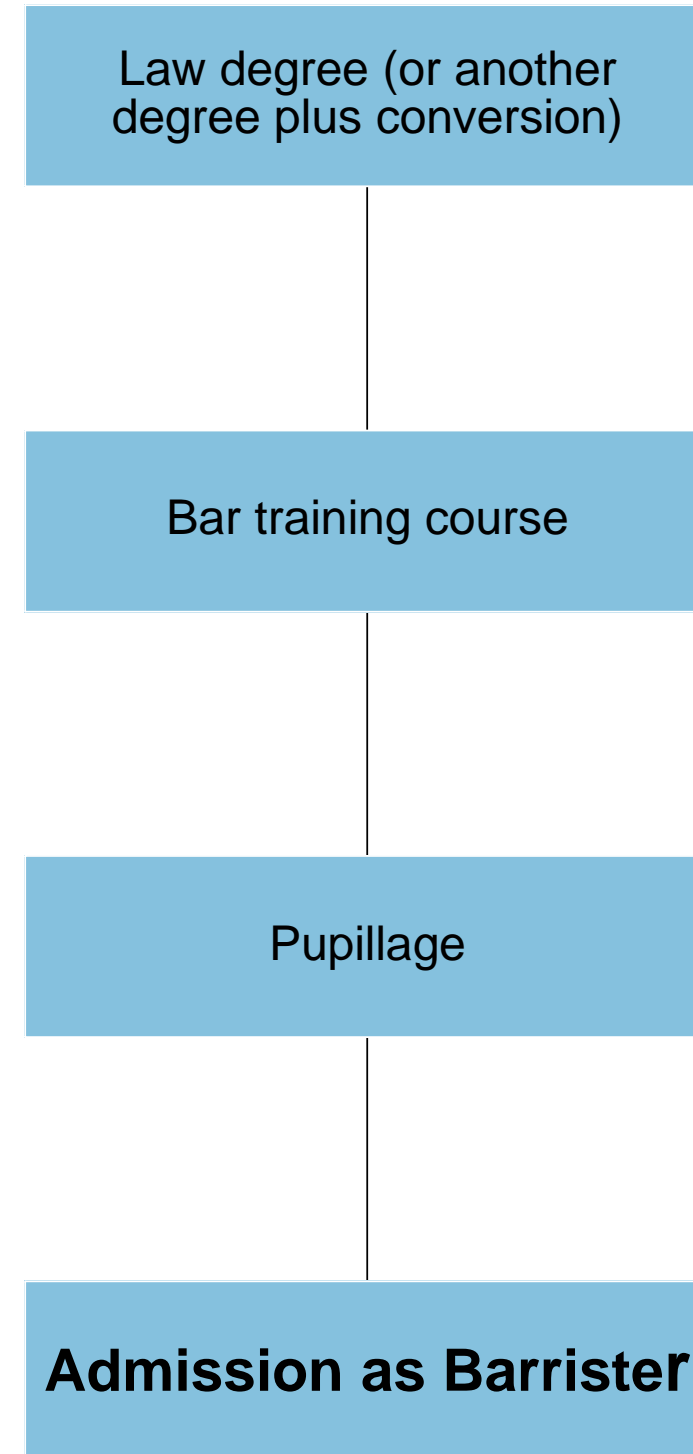
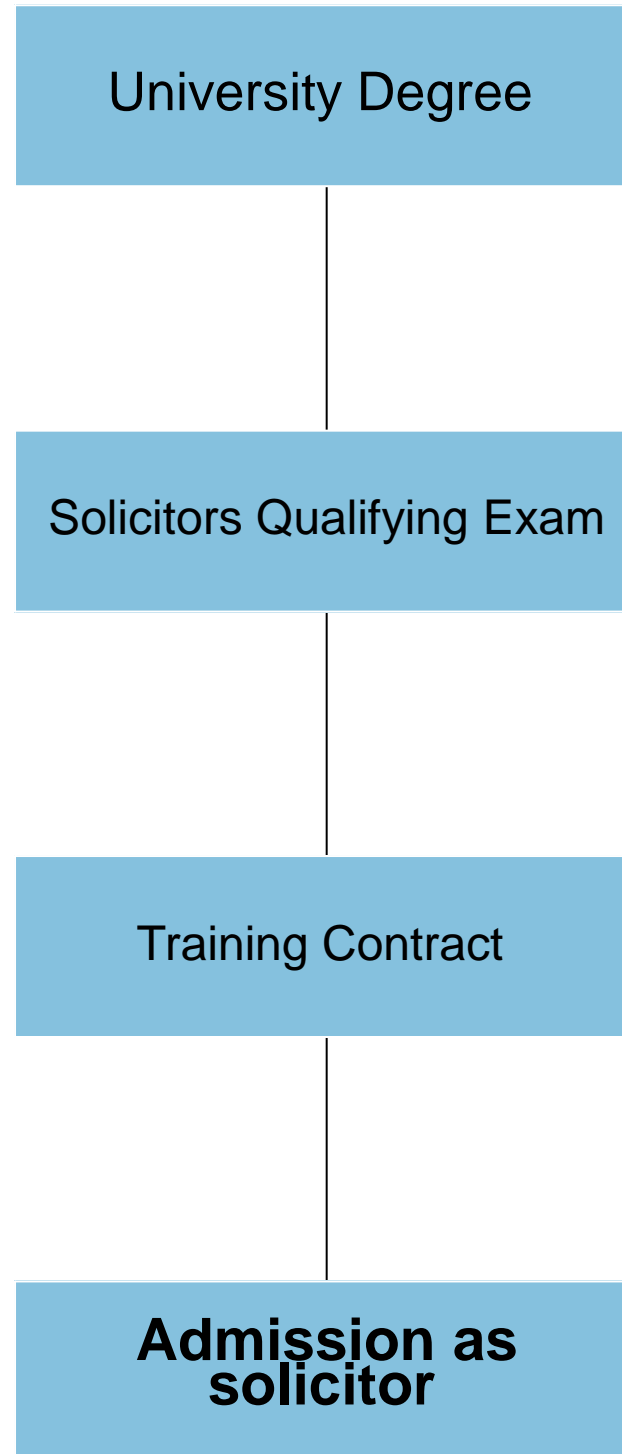
Solicitor

- Specialises in ‘contentious’ and/or ‘non-contentious’ work
- Gives legal advice
- Drafts legal documents
- Liaises with clients and other professionals such as barristers
- Represents clients in court (solicitors can also be advocates)

Solicitor

Construction and infrastructure dispute

- Work (“act”) for developers, builders, banks/funders and government bodies (building things)
- Real estate (homes, shops, offices), Infrastructure (roads, bridges, railways, airports) and energy (solar, wind, oil & gas)
- Specialises in ‘contentious’ work – i.e. resolving disputes around breaches of contract
- Contract disputes: defects, delay, payment etc.
- Avoiding disputes.

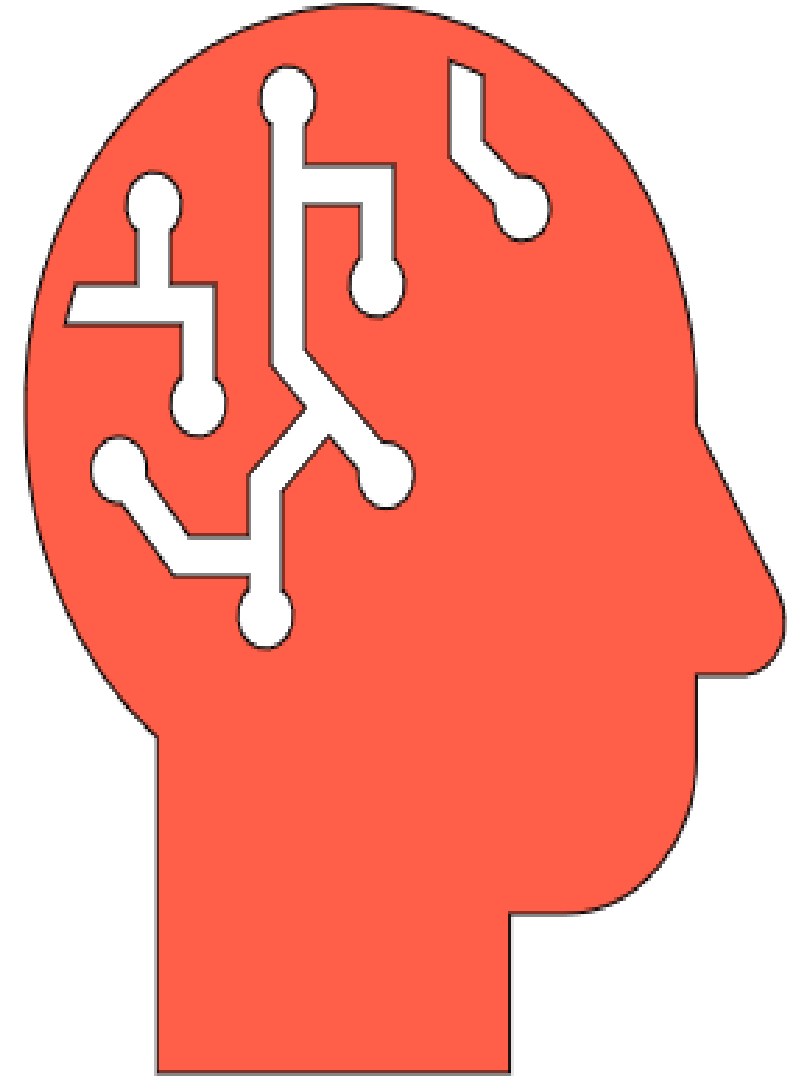
What a typical day looks like

- Reviewing and advising on contracts (interpretation)
- Collating and analysing evidence to build a case
- Drafting statements of case – claim or defence
- Drafting witness statements
- Instructing and meeting with experts
- Liaising with barristers to prepare for hearings/ trials
- Meeting with clients to advise
- Writing to clients to advise
- Negotiating with the other side
- Writing to the other side



How do I know if I would be interested in law?

- ☐ Interested in words

- ☐ Enjoy debating (this is different from arguing!)
- ☐ Enjoy being challenged
- ☐ Enjoy problem solving
