It was a real pleasure to welcome back former student **Molly Hyde** who spoke to our Year 10 GCSE PE students, and some of our Year 9 girl footballers, about her progression from Beaminster School to study Theatre and Sociology at university, get an MSc and then a truly unique role at The Scottish PFA. Molly shared how her involvement in numerous extra-curricular programmes had given her the confidence to always seize opportunities, such as volunteering in Tanzania and helping to organise football events. After the adversity of a difficult footballing injury, they also provided alternative options and a source of helpful contacts that moved her career onto a different path. This, along with her insight into GCSE PE topics such as commercialisation, sponsors and different careers in sport, made it an inspirational talk. Against a very capable Pool Academy from Cornwall, the girls battled right until the end, but lost out; playing with great energy and smiles they deserve huge credit for making it such a competitive game.

There has been a palpable excitement, along with a good deal of nerves, as Year 10 finalise their **Work Experience** placements and prepare themselves for a fortnight of life in the working world from Monday. Mr Donovan, Mrs Van Niekerk, Tutors and our Admin team have done a magnificent job to organise over 120 placements, and I am particularly grateful to all the employers who are supporting this hugely valuable experience. We wish all our students well and staff are looking forward to visiting many of them at their placements over the coming days.

Also, looking ahead, as part of our **education and wellbeing programme**, we have an online drama presentation for all Key Stage 3 students on Wednesday. The production, 'Hope', deals with issues around bullying and derogatory language in a sensitive and reflective way through a relevant and contemporary story that is specially written for schools.
