Summer Bridging tasks:	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Buy a folder and label it ‘Tragedy’. 2. Create an A4 page of notes on the history of tragedy literature. Tragedy Definition, Examples, History, Types, & Facts Britannica 3. Start the reading log – note down anything you’ve read over the last two years. 4. Read at least 1 book – you could pick something from the attached reading list. 5. Find and bring in a copy of a poem that you think fits into the genre of tragedy.

Lots of excellent critical analysis in this edition to support analysis of the play. Particularly suitable for students wishing to secure the top grades at A Level.</p> <p>Routledge’s New Critical Idiom books: these are detailed, useful introductions to genre (i.e., the gothic, comedy, tragedy, etc.) Again, by reading these books you will give yourself a head-start.</p> <p>Peter Barry, Beginning Theory (Manchester University Press): an excellent introduction into the fascinating world of critical theory. Older editions are available cheaply online.</p> <p>Oxford University Press’ ‘Very Short Introductions’: These books offer good introductions to theories and genres, but can sometimes be a little heavy-going.</p> <p>Abrams Glossary of Literary Terms: You will find a second-hand copy reasonably cheaply online.</p>
